### Background

Nichiren Daishonin wrote this letter in 1270 at Kamakura to Toki Jōnin. He thanks Toki for the polished rice he

had sent as an offering, just when the Daishonin's supply had nearly run out.



## 402. Reply to Hyōe no Sakan

I HAVE received the five thousand coins that you so kindly sent. I chanted Nam-myoho-rence-kyo once to report this.

The eighteenth day of the sixth month

### Background

Nichiren Daishonin wrote this letter at Minobu on the eighteenth day of the sixth month of 1281 (another view suggests 1277) to express his thanks to

Hyōe no Sakan, or Ikegami Munenaga, the younger of the two Ikegami brothers, who had sent him an offering of five thousand coins.



## 403. On the One Great Matter

ASSERT it clearly and decisively! The one great matter regarding this person, Nichiren.

### Background
